

W. C. C. CHEERLEADERS

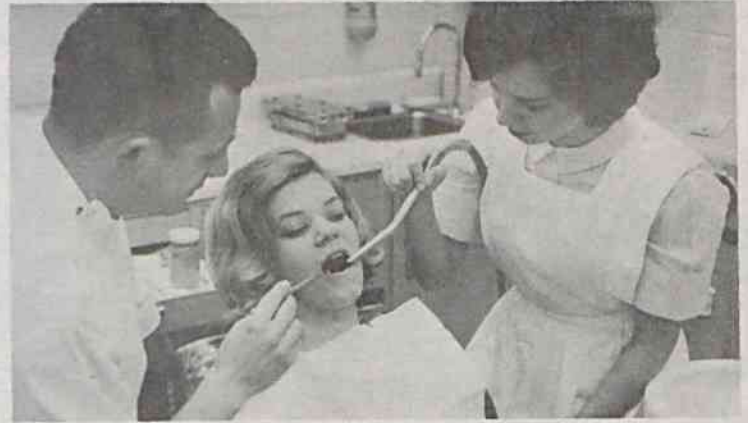
Any student interested in being a cheerleader will try out, and members of the faculty and the Student Government officers will vote on the best qualified people.
