Reaction to medicine led to a battle for life

Almost two years ago on May 17, 2005, WCC staff member Meredith Mozingo called into work saying that she would be late. Feeling sick, she went to a medical facility and was prescribed an antibiotic. She had the prescription filled and was at work by 9:30 a.m. She took her first dose of the antibiotic and began to feel sicker. By the next morning on May 18, her father

remained there for six weeks on life support.

Meredith was diagnosed with Stevens-Johnson Syndrome. This is a potentially deadly skin disease that usually results from a drug reaction that can affect any age group. Internally and externally, the skin and body burn. Meredith explains that "my skin was so bad, they had to wrap it to keep it from falling off. Because I lost my sight, everyone explained to me See Ms. Mozingo, page 13
