Official Class Attendance Policy

Printed below is the official class attendance policy as set up by the WCC faculty and administrators, and outlined by the Dean of Instruction:

A. A student who incurs in any class, one UNEXCUSED absence in excess of the number of times a class meets per week will be considered as dropped from the course.

B. Absences may be excused when caused by personal illness, death in the immediate family, or participation in approved college activities.

C. It is the responsibility of the student to clear his absence with his instructor within one week after the student returns to class. Any conflict in regard to whether an absence is excused or unexcused will be referred to the Office of the Dean of Instruction.

D. A student who incurs in

any class one absence, excused or unexcused, in excess of twice the number of times a class meets per week will be referred to the Office of the Dean of Instruction,

Announcements


