

Three Cheers For Landscapers

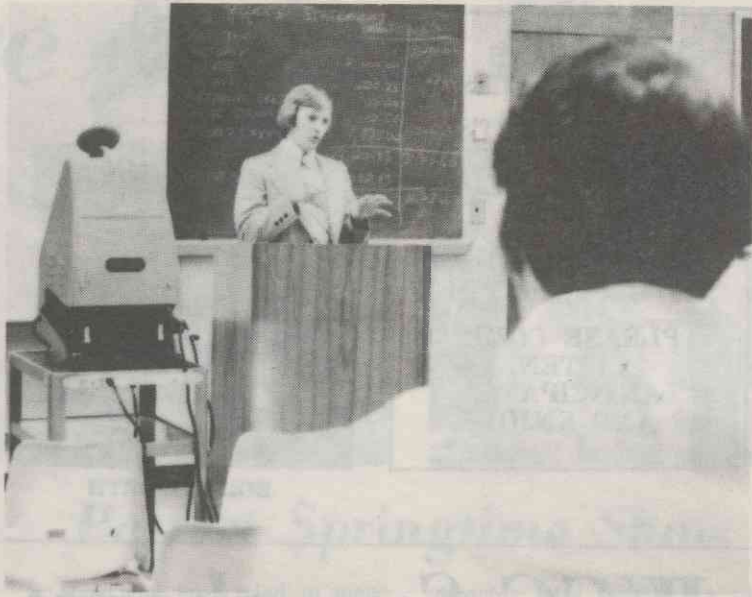

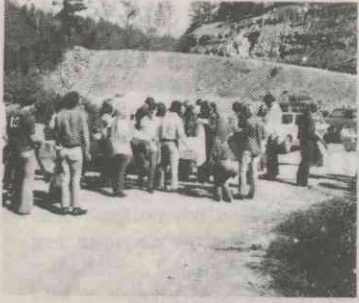

WCC 'PITCHES IN'

The activity was WCC's contribution to the National Collegiate Pitch-in Week, a drive co-sponsored by ABC Radio and Anheuser-Busch, aimed at cleaning up unsightly heaps of rubbish in localities where both have an affiliate and are within reasonable distance of the closest college.

Sponsors offer fine \$1,000 national awards for the best planned and most effective ef-

fort. Local incentive prize money was donated by Forester Beverage Co., Inc.

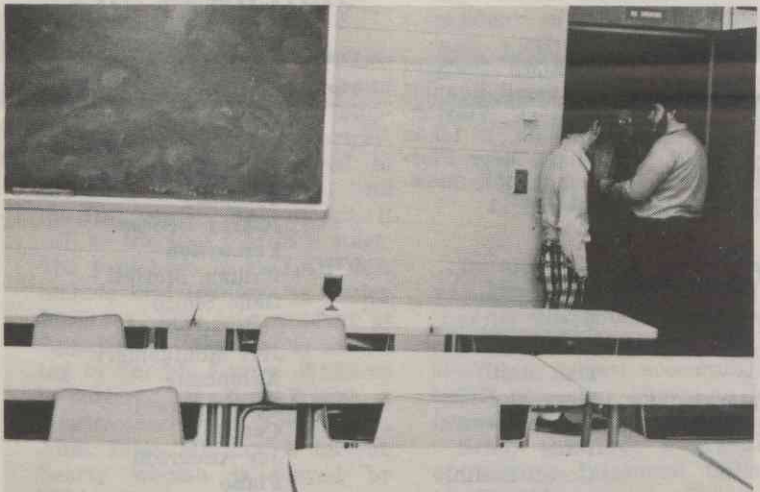
It was a time of communion with God in its deepest sense.
