Shirlene Dillard, a Food Service Management student at Wilkes Community College, won the John Sector Award for the Most Artistic Display in the 1993 Culinary Salon sponsored by Professional Chefs of North Carolina and the North Carolina Restaurant Associations at their annual show. The show was held last week at the Charlotte Merchandise Mart in Charlotte, NC. Ms. Dillard's entry earned a gold medal in the student pastry category as well.

The entry, themed "Circus, Circus," is an array of circus clowns and animals made of Marzipan, a pastry made of almond paste and powdered sugar. Food coloring is used to color the pastry mixture, which, according to Ms. Dillard, is a sort of "grown-up Play Dough" and then is modeled into shapes. Ms. Dillard's shapes consist of circus clowns, dogs jumping through hoops, elephants balancing balls, seals spinning balls on their noses. Each group of figures, approximately 2" in height, are posed atop mirrors to show off the minute details.
