People attended from Missouri, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia who either moved to Boone or were still commuting. She was quite amazed that people would come from so far to attend ASU and that many of those were commuting instead of living in Boone.

Next I questioned about any interesting things that she liked to do with whatever free time she may have. She responded quickly by counting off the many activities offered at Appalachian: clubs, parties, computer labs, and a student lounge. She commented that there were clubs for virtually any interest that anyone may have. Magic the Gathering club and a Cyclists club were just two she mentioned. She continued to explain that there are parties on and off campus for those interested. She also mentioned there is many extracurricular activities to fill time, such as dancing, plays, concerts, football games and even a one dollar theatre for the students to attend if they desire. My interviewee, who is rather fond of the computer labs, told me that the labs are everywhere but that Appala-

chian appears to keep some of them hidden away just past some of the teachers' offices.

(Which she came across totally by accident). I

then asked her to describe the student lounge.

She responded by saying the lounges have plush chairs for students wanting some relaxing down time but also desks that students could use for study and a T.V. was also available. She said in the lounge area one could find vending machines. I concluded that these would be particularly helpful when a student gets the mid-day munchies. My next question was: "Are there any good places to eat?" She looked quite transfixed for a moment and I soon found out why. She replied that other than campus cafeterias there was a restaurant for nearly every type of taste, including a Chick-Fil-It, fast-food, oriental cuisine, salads, and sweets.

My last question was one that I had wondered about for a long time. I asked what the biggest difference was between WCC and Appalachian. She responded rather quickly and said that the vast number of people was the biggest difference. She guessed that there were over thirteen thousand people who attended Appalachian. She said that it was really hard to realize that there were this many people on one campus and stated that the only time you truly
