Were our Library supplied with many copies of each of the books which the teachers from time to time "reserve," perhaps there would be no opportunity for manifesting our thoughtfulness (or lack of it) for others. As it is when all the members of a club or of a class or a debating team or a literary society are sure to want a certain set of books, if they keep up with the work which that club or class, etc., is doing-and one member takes those books for his or her own use and stows them away in their room, what can one term such conduct but selfishness? When an individual is given special privilege to take a "reserved" book out during "closed hours" can such an one afford to abuse that privilege? Is it a reasonable excuse to say "I forgot," when you are jeopardizing some one else on a possible "D," or at least a failure to get "A"?

There is no place on the campus better adapted to study than the Library. It is light, airy quiet, and the Librarian makes an effort to keep the working material at command unless thwarted as above indicated.

And suppose you are very much wanting to read some of the new fiction which is added occasionally-and some one keeps it the full two weeks' limit? Put yourself in either place and study the situation.

Again, when the teachers keep indefinitely the very best reference material on given lines, are they fair to the students who wish to make investigations on those subjects?

The matter of registering material taken from the Library is seemingly a very small matter and yet a failure in this regard makes much difficulty sometimes

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
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
