ALUMNI NOTES.

The Meeting in Greensboro.

Some thirty members of the Alumni Association met at the Y. M. C. A. building in Greensboro Monday afternoon, March 13th, at 4.30 in response to the call of the executive committee. The purpose of the meeting was stated by Miss Virginia Ragsdale, the chairman of the committee, which was to find out the attitude of the Alumni on the question of nominations for the Board of Trustees of the college. At the August meeting of the Alumni, it will be remembered, a resolution was passed to the effect that the Alumni elect, from three candidates, a person who was then to become the nominee of the association for the position of trustee, the Board having the power to accept or reject the person thus nominated. Because of later developments the executive committee, whose duty it was (according to the August resolution) to name the three candidates felt that it could not proceed without the dictum of the Association; hence the meeting on Monday, March 13th.

The matter was then discussed very fully by the meeting and a motion was made that the resolution passed in August be rescinded. An amendment was added to the effect that a committee be appointed by the president with power to investigate more carefully the proposition of alumni representation on the Board of Trustees, confer with the Board, and submit a report at the meeting of the Alumni at commencement. The motion passed as amended and the resolution providing for the nomination of a trustee by the Alumni was declared rescinded and an investigating committee was to be appointed later by President Blair. The reasons for the action of the meeting as brought out in the discussion were: the plan as proposed by the August resolution was hastily conceived and speedily passed without due reflection, and that a more thorough and satisfactory plan could be arrived at if the proper consideration was given the matter. It was also stated that considerable opposition to the plan adopted in August had arisen and that possibly nominations by the Association would not be favorably receiv ed. In view of these considera tions the meeting took the action above mentioned.

In line with the action of the meeting, President Blair has announced the appointment of the committee as follows: S. H. Hodgin, '95, chairman, Virginia Ragsdale, '92, and L. Lea White, '04.


