Not a miscue was registered against either team, "which is a decided, marked and distinct innovation for college ball." The splendid hurling of Murchison was in a large part responsible for the utter defeat of the Farmers and Engineers hailing from Raleigh. He caused fourteen to bite the dust, and wonder how a ball could be made to cut up such capers. side pitching a wonderful game, he drove out a double, a single and a sacrifice in four times at bat.
