Mrs. Binford gave a comprehensive view of the racial and geographical growth of the country, describing the primitive settlements along the rivers, the Slavic invasions, the annexation of Poland, and the unification of the empire before the reign of Peter the Great.

Miss Ella Ball gave a clear explanation of the change in Russian life from the days of feudal serfdom to the modern period of industrial serfdom. The growing class consciousness following the industrial revolution, terminating in the revo-

lutions of 1905 and 1917 was explained carefully.

Both reports kindled the interest of all the members present in the Russian situation.
