DEEP WELL AGAIN IN SERVICE

On Saturday evening about five-thirty the pump in the deep well was started for the first time since the Christmas holidays. At that time it was believed that the well had failed as it had been showing symptoms of decreasing supply for over a year. Unfortunately the pump did not drain out completely and the main casting in the pumphead burst during the cold weather in January. When it was found that the expense of the projected reservoir and filter would be excessive it was determined to make a last effort to determine with certainty whether the fault of the well was absence of water or a deficiency in the pump. William Nelson, who was in charge of the water, heat and light for about five years previous to 1916, when he was at the

College last June, expressed the opinion that the fault lay in the pump. Accordingly the pump has been given a complete overhauling. Some sand has been umped out of the bottom of the well. An electric motor has been installed and the pump is now in better shape than it has been for years. The pump was operated for twelve hours continuously on Sunday and the well showed no sign of failure. It is hoped that this has solved the water problem of the College.

A larger water heater has been installed in Cox Hall and on Saturday demonstrated its efficiency to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Tremain who during the past summer has traveled all the way to Arkansas and followed the harvesters in order to harden himself, will snap the pig skin at center. Tom Cox, left guard. Cox needs no introduction. The scrubs are not the only ones who dread him. E. McBane with all his two hundred pounds of bone and sinew is smashing things in left tackle. Charles Rolison, left end. Rolison is seldom seen in a scrimmage; only a "streak" where he was, is visible.

The backfield will probably be made up of the following men. Capt. A. I. Newlin, quarterback. Newlin made a good record in 1917, and is now back in the game after his much "hard luck" last season. C. Stout a "ten second" man is back in his old position at left halfback. H. Raiford, right halfback, has conquered the law of gravitation and is now able to hold his head in a lower atmosphere and pierce the line. M. F. White, fullback. "Boney" never has failed to gain ground. What he will do now since spending three straight months logging is a subject for speculation. R. Tremain, last year's quarterback is stronger than at any previous season. G. McBane is developing into a driving halfback. Both of the two last named will probably take part in the game. A number of scrubs will be taken and used if necessary as recruits.
