

ALUMNI NOTES

At the commencement meeting of the Alumni Association, it was decided to launch a movement to interest graduates and old students in athletics at the College. The Association went on record as favoring some form of required and supervised recreation for all students attending Guilford College. To make effective a scheme of general athletics the Association conceded the necessity of the moral and financial support of the Alumni and old students. The chairman of the Association Athletic Committee was instructed to prepare a letter setting forth the plan of Coach Doak and the College authorities for general recreational athletics and mail to members of the Association. This letter was prepared and mailed to a greater part of those known to be interested in athletics, with the request that they join the College Athletic Association on the same basis as students—pay the regular fee, or more, if they saw fit, and be entitled to all the privileges of active members. This includes season tickets for home games and schedules of all games.

Funds received from this source are to be handled by the chairman of the Association Athletic Committee acting as Graduate Manager of Athletics, thus putting the Association in a position to supervise athletics at the College in an advisory capacity. It is understood that no part of the funds so raised shall be employed in relieving defunct managers of athletic teams, but shall be used for permanent improvements and such equipment as becomes necessary to put general athletics on a sound basis.

The response to this appeal has been reasonably generous, yet many who are doubtless interested have just neglected to avail themselves of this opportunity to help the cause along. It is not yet too late. If you have failed to get your letter, consider this notice as personal and mail your check to L. L. White, Chairman of Committee, Guilford College, N. C. is woman's place to purify it. The politics of the women is going to be pure, regardless of party. A woman is not going to adopt any kind of politics which she is not able to carry to her church. The state of religion under the King of kings and the state of government under the people are going to be considered subjects closely related to each other. Mrs. Sharp also spoke of the League of Nations, saying that she would not pledge herself to support any treaty which was formed in such a manner that the makers of the treaty had no time to offer prayer to God, asking for wisdom and counsel, in the forming of such a League. In addition she said, that she was not willing to uphold a Treaty that would fasten a noose around the neck of her own son while the other end of the rope was held by foreign power.

Mrs. Sharpe is the daughter of the late Judge Settle of Greensboro, a man of whom North Carolina has every reason to be proud. She is a lady well fitted for the position which she will hold, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. For thirty years she has been a teacher in North Carolina and knows full well the needs of the State. Today she stands ready to serve, and to work, to make the future citizens of this country, the children of today, one hundred per cent Americans.
