ROADS

At the present time there is under construction in North Carolina 116.5 miles of concrete and asphalt road. The estimated cost of this hard-surfaced road is approximately \$3,799,538. Besides this there is under construction in this state 375.6 miles of gravel and clay road. The latter will cost approximately \$3,730,098. The hard surfaced road just completed between Guilford college and Greensboro costs approximately \$35,270 per mile according to the North Carolina Highway Bulletin.

ALUMNI NOTES

The following communication signed, "Alumnus" speaks for itself and is published under Alumni Notes without comment.

"I have visited Guilford College two or three times within the past six months and the ruins of what was once the splendid entrance to the college has been the first thing to meet my eye. The view presents the appearance of an approach to some old abandoned castle rather than the entrance way to a modern college. The material necessary for the restoration of the structure seems to lie on the grounds and has been, to my knowledge, for some time. Just why the matter rests here I have been unable to ascertain.

As I recall, the entrance way was donated by one of the classes to graduate some years ago as a class memorial—a splendid monument to the spirit of the class in the first instance. However, I should think they ought to see to it that the matter of reconstruction should be attended to without delay. Certainly the situation demands the attention of some one as the present approach leaves a bad impression on the mind of the casual visitor to the college, as well as the traveling public on the main highway that skirts the campus. Guilford has not been abandoned by any means though the approach might indicate otherwise."

An excerpt from a letter recently received at the college from Anna C. Shamburger, a student of last year's sophomore class, will be read with interest by her friends here. "I am registered in the school of Hygiene and Public Health as a candidate for the Bachelor's degree; however, I have a course in organic chemistry at Homewood, the college of Arts and Sciences of the Johns Hopkins University.....I miss the Guilford atmosphere and comradeship very much and think of you very often."

Dixon '89 of Missoula, Montana, is the Republican candidate for Governor of that state with the strong probability of election before this item appears in print.
