AS OTHERS SEE US

There appeared in a recent issue of the "Raleigh News And Observer" an article which should be of unusual interest to Guilfordians for it gives us an idea of how others see us. This article was written by Mr. Frank M. Harper, former Superintendent of Raleigh Public Schools. Mr. Harper was on our campus three days. During this time he was able to observe all phases of college life here. He was favorably impressed and warmly praised our institution. He saw our college as a perfect democracy, whose machinery is unhampered by fraternities or secret societies of any kind. The way we conduct our athletics, our method of encouraging debating by emphasizing work in the literary societies, the individual attention and quality of training given, and the general home-like atmosphere which prevails on the campus, favorably impressed him. He believes that the training which one receives in a small college like Guilford is decidedly superior to that received in larger institutions. He said, "We can't help feeling proud of the State's record in agriculture, but we would feel prouder still if we also ranked fourth in the number of young people now attending our colleges, and receiving the excellent training which Guilford College gives."
