"We, the members of Guilford College Alumni Association assume the leadership and responsibility of the campaign to raise \$275,000 for Guilford, and we pledge our loyal support and service to this task until it is completed."

The President of the Association was instructed to appoint a committee to organize the work in connection with the Trustees and the Faculty of the College.

It was keenly felt by those present that it was the most critical moment in the history of the institution, and yet optimism prevailed for it is the first time that the Association has ever been offered \$100,000 with which to start a campaign.
