These two barefoot boys with their marbles and fishing hooks; Tom Sawyer's sore toe, and Huck Finn's stock of yarns about Widow Jackson, were indeed humorous and quite representative of Mark Twain. The single number was a piano piece, "Fifth Nocturne," played by Myrta White.

In response to a speech, expressing the pleasure of having as their guests the Philomathean Literary Society, by Nellie Allen, president of the Zatasian society, Misses Helen Bostick, Hope Motley, Marie Beaman, Edith Macon and Lalah Hassel expressed the thanks and pleasure of the Phils in being so delightfully entertained. Hazel Richardson who served as critic for the evening gave some constructive criticism and the society was adjourned.

A very pleasant social hour followed. Delicious cake and block cream served by the hostesses helped to make the occasion a truly delightful one.
