At these anual meetings questions of mutual interest to the colleges are considered-such matters as financial campaigns, scholastic standards, co-operation with inter-church educational or-

The main feaure of Dr. Binford's trip was a visit to Antioch College, with which he was favorably impressed. Antioch College says Dr. Binford is conducting one of the most interesting experiments in higher education in America. "The students there alternate between five weeks of academic study and five weeks' work in various industries in the adjoining cities. Every student is paired with another student so that while one group is studying another is out working. This has been adopted, not so much as a means of giving students an opportunity to earn a goodly portion of their expenses while in 25% college, but rather as a program The percentage of active mem- of education. The administration bership of the remaining classes is believes that work under college guidance is a very important part of a liberal education. Such participations in the various progressions and in industry increases one's interest and enthusiasm in his college studies and at the same time keeps the student in break between college training and life work. This experiment of Antioch is attracting wide attenresponse by young people seeking a preparation for life. The enrollment there has increased some 300 per cent. since the plan was inaugurated two and a half years ago.
