MRS. COLE DESCRIBES THE CHINESE WEDDING TO PHILS

"A typical Shanghai wedding" was the subject of Mrs. Cole's talk to the Philomathean Literary Society last Friday night. She described a wedding among the wealthy classes, who have adopted many of the western customs in their marriage ceremony.

It is the custom for the parents of the bride to send presents to the parents of the groom the day before the wedding. The bride also sends her own room furniture to the groom's home. The invitations which have been sent to the friends of the groom states that the wedding is at one o'clock. However, the bride does not arrive until about five o'clock when the groom goes after her. The marriage ceremony itself is very much like our own.
