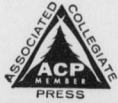

3. Renovation of Archdale Hall - - Providing in this dormitory also an apartment for a faculty student counselor.

C—Athletic and Playing Fields - - adequate for a well-balanced intercollegiate and intramural program.

D—Memorial Hall - - to be renovated

to provide classrooms, faculty and administrative offices.

E—Plans for additional faculty rental housing will be considered.

F—Discussion of plans and costs for other essential improvements in the central heating plant and Founders Hall.

II—A Campus Plan is essential for

promotional purposes as well as for planning and placing all future buildings and for all campus development - - roads, walks, planting, etc.
