The Guilfordian has been a consistently poor reading and poorlyrated newspaper. I feel that an almost complete revision would be the best means of improve-

The task of improving the paper should begin on the editorial page. The editorial policy of the Guilfordian has been conspicuously non-assertive. Positiveness is a necessary quality in any editorial column and one that I should try to implant on page two of the Guilfordian. News items however, would be presented factually with no opinion displayed. It has occurred to me many times that there is a need for an editorial on the sports page. This would permit the sports editor to air his views and report news objectively. More active participation by the student body would be encouraged by guest editorials with by-lines for the guest editors. I would also like to attempt a "Letters to the Editor" section, where students and faculty could express personal feelings.

The entertainment value of the Guilfordian has been reduced to 'Arnold." By eliminating superfluous articles, we could devote their space to original and perhaps syndicated articles which would create enough interest would among the students to be read. Additional space would be quired by adding new articles. This could be allotted by cutting down on the amount of advertising, which at present covers 25% of the newspaper, or one of the four pages.
