"Classrooms Abroad" To Go To Europe Again This Summer

Five groups, each containing twenty-five selected American college students, will visit Berlin, Germany, Grenoble or Besancon, France, Vienna, Austria, and Santander, Spain next summer to study the language, culture and civilization of these countries during an eight-week stay. Designed for serious students who do not plan to see all of Europe in a short summer, Classrooms Abroad tries to teach a seminar in area studies through a summer of actual living in one of these cities. All groups will undergo intensive language training during the boat trip. Students will hear lectures on history and literature and meet with outstanding personalities.

They will have full auditing privileges at the Free University of Berlin and the Universities of Grenoble, Besancon, Vienna, and Santander. Full information on the program can be obtained by writing to Classrooms Abroad, Box 4171 University Station, Minneapolis 14, Minn.
