## Leg. Fills Committee Vacancies

The Student Legislature filled two vacancies on student-faculty committees at its Monday night meeting in the Leake Room.

Bob Milan was elected by the legislature to fill a vacancy on the Athletic Committee. Craig Chapman was named to the Curriculum Committee.

Student Government President Dan Hulburt reported that several committees similarly concerned with proposing a unit of living system had merged.

Craig Chapman, chairman of the newly merged committee, reported that under the unit of living rule, each dorm would be a unit which would draft a constitution regarding such items as drinking, social hours, quiet hours, and women's hours.

Chapman announced that the target date for presentation of the committee's proposal has been moved from the January 31st Trustee meeting to the March 31st Trustee meeting.

He added that there will be open forums to discuss the final committee proposal before it is submitted to the Student Legislature.

Before presentation to the Board of Trustees, the proposal will have to be approved not only by the Student Legislature but by the Student Affairs Committee and the Administrative Council as well.

# MIG To Test Constitution

In a special meeting last Monday night, the MIG Judicial Board decided to call a meeting of MIG after the semester break to interpret the MIG Constitution's provisions for the removal of officers.

The committee's interpretation will determine whether impeachment proceedings against MIG Vice-President Phil Edgerton should be heard by MIG or all men students.

With the exception of Edgerton, who maintained that the wording of the MIG Constitution clearly indicated that he should be tried by all the men students, the Judicial Board members concurred in the decision.

Proceedings against Edgerton stem from his alleged part in an incident involving the presence of Martha Robertson in the parlor of suite C-31 in the 1968 Men's Dorm during Homecoming Weekend.

According to the charges, Ed-

gerton, who was summoned by an R.A. who heard a woman's voice in the C-31 suite to watch the door of the suite until the head resident could be located, warned the occupants of the suite about the head resident's impending arrival.

## PROBATION GIVEN

In a WSC Judicial Board trial, Miss Robertson was found guilty of being present in the suite parlor and sentenced to disciplinary probation until May.

Moulton Avery and Evan Davis were tried on charges of permitting Miss Robertson to occupy the suite parlor. They were convicted and given reprimands. Charges against two other men students involved in the case, David Angell and Rafael Arrieta, were dropped.

Following are excerpts from the MIG Constitution explaining membership and impeachment:

## Article III: Membership

Section A: All male resident students are members of the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government and as such they are entitled to attend all regular meetings of the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government.

## Article IX: Removal of Officers and Representatives

Section A: The failure to maintain no less than a cumulative academic average of 1.00 will automatically discharge a representative or an officer from his duties.

Section B: Any representative who fails to attend two consecutive Men's Inter-Dormitory Government meetings without appointing an assistant to represent his section or floor is automatically removed from his representative position.

Section C: Any Officer or Representative of the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government may be expelled from the body by two-thirds vote of the total membership.

Section D: Any charge brought against an Officer or Representative of the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government must be presented before the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government and any Officer or Representative subject to expulsion shall have the full opportunity to defend himself.

Section E: All dormitory governments shall operate in a similar manner.

## Article X: Replacement of Officers and Representatives

### Section A: Officers

In case of the removal of the President from Office, or of his resignation or inability to discharge the powers and duties of said office, the same shall devolve upon the Vice-President. Student Legislature of Guilford College may provide for a vacancy in the offices of President and Vice-President of the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government. The Men's Inter-Dormitory Government may provide for a vacancy in the office of the President and Vice-President of the dormitory governments.

# Course Revision Proposed

The Educational Policies Committee recently formulated proposals that would alter the course structure and other aspects of Guilford's present academic system. The proposals were submitted to the department chairmen, who will determine if the proposed system is feasible.

The central aspect of the pro-

posed program involves reducing the number of courses offered by the departments and required for students. Instead of an average course load consisting of five three hour courses, under the new system a student would take four four hour courses each semester.

The majority of the courses would meet twice a week, pos-

sibly leaving Wednesday as a "free day." More emphasis would be placed on work outside of the classroom.

According to proponents of such a system, the main advantage would be the reduced course load for both students and faculty, enabling them to teach and learn more effectively.

The number of courses offered in each department would be limited to sixteen. Eight courses would be required for a major.

If the department chairmen react favorably to the proposed system, it will be submitted to the entire faculty, who will determine if such changes should be adopted.

The Educational Policies Committee is a student-faculty committee. Dr. Daryl Kent is chairman. This committee has also proposed that the calendar year be changed, with the first semester ending before the Christmas holidays.

## Hut Hears Jug Band

Anne's Bradstreet Band performed in an informal concert last Monday night in the Hut.

## Vandalism Hits Shore

On December 15 a small band of students threw rock-filled snowballs at windows in Shore Dormitory.

Several windows were broken, shattering glass narrowly missing at least one student. No charges have been filed due to a lack of witnesses willing to testify.

Charges against other students involved in other incidents that same evening were presented to the Judicial Board of the Men's Inter-Dormitory Government at a January 15 trial.

One student was convicted on charges of tampering with another student's property, physical abuse of a college official, obscene language, failure to comply with the directive of a college official, and implied physical violence against a college official.

MIG sentenced the student to disciplinary probation for the remainder of his academic career with the provision that he be allowed to play football.

Two other students were convicted on charges of being in a woman's dormitory after closing hours. They were given reprimands.
