If you are an adventurous woman who doesn't mind giving up old friends, doesn't mind living an unsettled life, and is accessible to a recruiting officer, the United States Air Force might be the place for you.

According to Portia Mc-Cracken, the military is 'really, really pushing wointo positions where they have not previously been accepted. The United States Air Force Academy has recently begun to accept women, and women pilots have just begun to fly. This emphasis on equal opportunity makes a woman's position in the military, especially the Air Force, a particularly desirable one.

Ms. McCracken has just finished serving three years in a traditionally male branch of the Air Force, Disaster Preparedness. In this position she spent eleven months in Thailand at the Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base, preparing for possible aircraft crashes, imminent attacks by neighboring countries, and natural disasters. She was first stationed at Vance Air Force Base in Oklahoma, where she and others had to keep a special lookout for tornadoes as well as being aware of other potential natural and man-made disas-

Among the benefits of working in the Air Force, Ms. McCracken rates advances in self-esteem very high. She claims that as a result of her training, she was able to greatly develop her own personal abilities and to create a new set of values for herself.
