Simon Wiesenthal From Vienna

Did you know that Nazis are alive and well and living all over the world. Yes, even here in the United States. And not just little, unimportant Nazis but past generals and commandants. These Nazis not only helped kill six million Jews but literally millions of Poles, Russians, Greeks - the list is endless for their murders and crimes. And what of Justice? Oh yes, there were the Nuremberg trials which brought to light a few hundred Nazis. But all too many were never even brought to trial.

Simon Wiesenthal, survivor of the Nazi death camps, has devoted his life to tracking down former Nazi war criminals. He will be coming to the United States for a limited engagement of twelve lectures. He shall be here in Greensboro at the War Memorial Auditorium, Monday March 1 at 8 p.m. There will be NO admission fee.

As founder and head of the Jewish Documentation Center in Vienna, Mr. Wiesenthal has been responsible for the court trials of 1100 important Nazis, among them the capture and trial of Adolf Eichman. (Eichman was the director and instigator of the gas chambers and ways and means of exterminating inmates of all the Nazi concentration camps. That was in 1961.

In 1965, he tracked down Boleslaw Maikowskis, former chief of police in Rezekne, Latvia, whose victims numbered 15,000. He was living in Mineola, New York and working as a plumber. In 1973 he discovered Dr. Huberyus Strughold, now head of

American Space medicine, was chief of the research center of the German Ministry of Aviation which carried out tests in Dachau, Natzweiler and Schirmeck-Vorbruck testing reactions to super-cooling, drinking sea-water, typhus vaccine and mustard gas. In July 1975, Mr. Wiesenthal discovered the whereabouts of Walter Kirschmann, who directed the execution of 18 Polish professors and 20 of their relatives in Lwow, Poland in 1941. Kirschmann had been living in Buenos Aires under the name of Pedro Ricardo Cases.

He still has over 300 active cases of wanted mass murderers in various stages of investigation and his files contain thousands of other names that might never get any attention, except for his diligence.

The subject of a recent telecast on ABC, Mr. Wiesenthal's work formed the basis of Frederick Forsyth's novel, and the motion picture, **The Odessa File**, starring Jon Voight. Let me add, that the Terrace theater in Friendly Shopping Center will be showing this film Thursday, Feb. 26 for groups at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. for \$1 per person, and at 5, 7, and 9 for the public. The Terrace theatre realizing the importance of Mr. Wiesenthal's appearance is offering this film as an
