

My faith in God and God's faithfulness to me in my times of need have given me a solid foundation to stand on. With a foundation so certain, I have the confidence to move in uncertain directions, to take on challenges that hold unpredictable outcomes, to stand firm in the face of opinions that are contrary to God-revealed truths, to be available to another in a time of weakness, and, I have the confidence to admit my own weaknesses, to do so and know that God still loves and accepts me.

Faith and trust in God imply a commitment, a commitment that is not easy to make, but Sun.—Thurs. 11 a.m. — 1 a.m. one that gives freedoms Fri. & Sat. till 2 a.m. heretofore unknown.
