The November Sierra club meeting (Piedmont Plateau Group) will be held on Monday evening at 7:30, on November 8, in the Gallery of Founder's Hall.



What does this mean for the future of urban growth in this rapidlygrowing area? What does it mean for employment in this area? Is inter-basin transfer of water the answer . . or is this robbing Peter to pay Paul?

Dr. Carl Dinga of the UNC-G Geography faculty will set the scene with a discussion of the local water availability; he will be followed by an attorney from the Department of Natural and Economic resources, briefly discussing the legal impediments to inter-basin transfer. Finally, a member of the Greensboro Water Planning Section will cover the local engineering situation. It should be a fascinating and informative evening of solid conservation learning!
