### Applicants Needed for New Judicial board

With the deadline for applications for the Campus Judicial Board and the Student Affairs Committee right around the corner, it might be helpful to explain the changes which have occured in the judicial system this year.

Previous to a proposal recently passed by the Administrative Council, there were two judicial systems operating on the campus - one for the main campus and one for the Urban Center. Now these two systems have merged into one Campus Judicial Board which represents all Guilford students.

This board has a student chairperson, six student members and three faculty members, as well as four student alternates and one faculty alternate. At least two fo the eleven student members selected will be Urban Center students. Anyone interested in applying for a position on the 1978-79 Campus Judicial

Board should obtain a petition

from the Dean of Students Office in Bryan Hall. The deadline to return them is April 1; selection will be made before May 1.

The Student Affairs Committee, which includes a Trial Board acting as an appeals court to the Campus Judicial Board, will also represent the Urban Center. At least one of the six student members on the committee must be an Urban Center student. Selection of the 1978-79 SAC will be made in the spring, not in the fall as in previous years. If you are interested in petitioning

for a position on the SAC, contact your senator for details.

There are two important reasons for these changes in the judicial system. First of all, the existence of separate systems for main campus and the Urban center has often led to an inconsistency in punishment. Secondly, because there

is not a separate faculty or separate classes, there arose a question of jurisdiction in many cases. The SAC felt that "fairness, consistency, and ultimately, justice, would be better served by having a single judicial procedure."
