Dr. John W. Blassingame, a noted editor, author, Yale Professor, and Acting Chairman of Afro-American Studies will deliver the ninth annual Rembert Patrick History Lecture on Wednesday evening April 5 entitled, "Africa, White Churches, and the Evolution of the Slave Family." The lecture is open to the public and will be held in the gallery at 7:30 p.m. with coffee afterwards.

Patrick as a memorial to her husband, a 1930 Guilford College graduate and former president of the Southern Historical Association, provides for a lecture each year by some distinguished historian qualified to speak in the areas of Negro History, Black Culture, Southern history, or Current Problems of the South.

Certainly, Dr. Blassingame's own history is a fascinating and varied one. His books include *Black New Orleans* and *The Slave Community*

while his list of published articles and Book Reviews is extensive with works in *The Smithsonian*, *The Washington Post*, and *Journal of American History* on such topics as "Negro Chaplains in the Civil War," "Sambos or Rebels; the Character of the Southern Slave" and "The Afro-Americans: From Mythology to REality" among others. He is interested in and writes about not only black, but many aspects of Southern and Urban History as well.
