"Guilford rabbi turns missionary at Family Weekend"

Philosophy Professor Jonathon Malino, who is an ordained rabbi, spoke at the Family Weekend President's Brunch on the subject of renewal.

He explored the seven-day cycle as an anomaly, pointing out that the week, unlike the day and year, is not based on any astronomical pattern.

In the culmination of his speech, he expounded upon the personal renewal afforded by a kept Sabbath. He specified that this day could be kept in any tradition or even secularly and in a flash of foresight expressed concern that his intent could be misconstrued as "missionary."

Several presentations/discussions will be held:

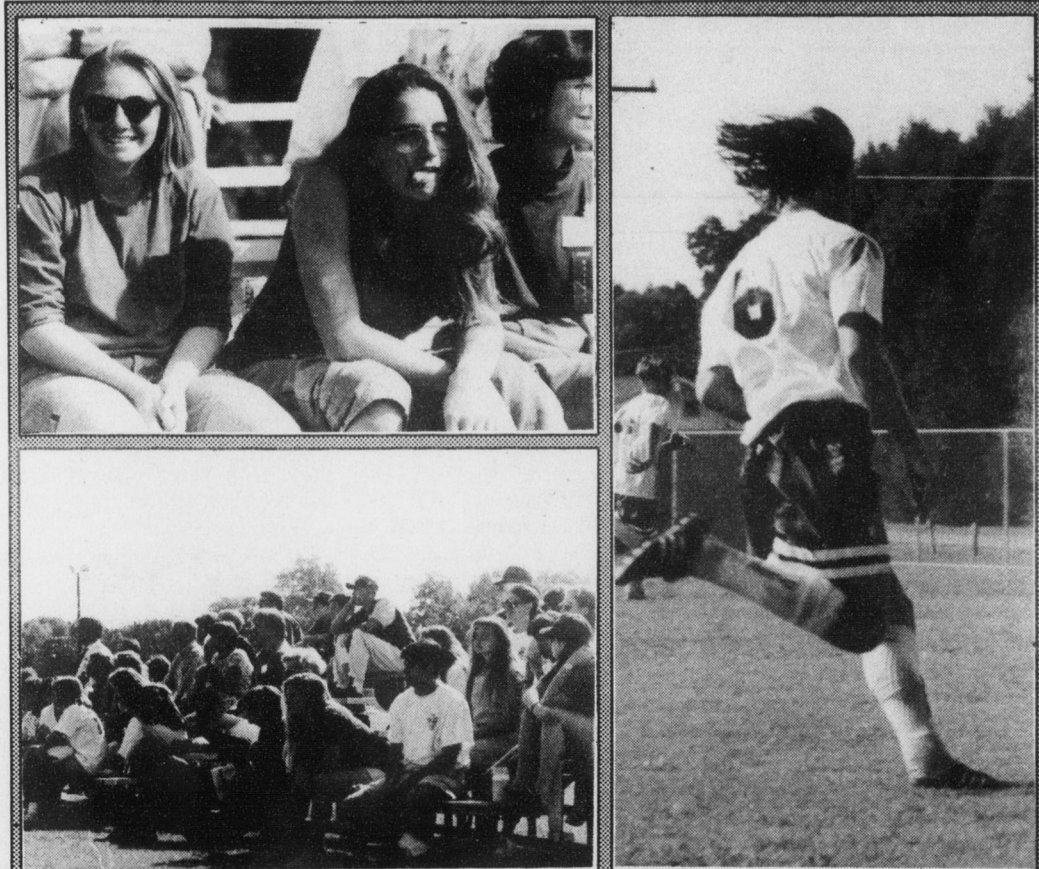
Sun 8pm, Gallery—"Why the Columbus myth is perpetuated in modern education," speaker Jan Elliot.

Senator's Notebook

Senate Secretary Brian Sugioka

Senate had a full agenda when they met this Wednesday at Ragsdale House for their weekly meeting.

The meeting started with the Executive Council members presenting their weekly reports. President Jen Hill expressed her concern over the many absences at the Sept. 23 meeting.

Vice President Jamie Whitehead announced that the Judicial Review Task Force is busy setting their agenda and should be ready to go when students return from fall break.

Secretary Brian Sugioka expressed the importance of senators going to their Res. hall council meetings. Senators were also reminded that attending these meetings is required for senators who represent Res. halls.

Much of the meeting was a

discussion on a special request for funds by a group going to Florida over fall break to help rebuild areas damaged by the hurricane. Bridget VandeWalle, representing the group, was on hand to answer questions.

The group's initial request went through Budget Committee where the proposed budget was examined. Budget Committee's recommendation to Senate was to fund no more than \$1,068 for the trip. The trip's budget called for a total of \$1,668. The \$600 cut recommended by Budget Committee was in the area of food, where \$750 had been asked for.

The food that needs to be bought by the group will be partially subsidized, however, by food donations from Marriott.

Some senators felt that those who go on the trip should at least pay for

food. VandeWalle mentioned that if students are forced to pay for their food, some of them would not be able to go.

The group has already raised \$600 in donations to help pay for the trip, and some Senators felt that the amount of money raised should be subtracted from any amount given by Senate.

Towards the end of discussion it was agreed that the project was important and that more money should be given for food, but specific amounts were not discussed. One idea was to give the group 50 cents for every dollar they fund-raise.

The Senate committee chairs gave brief descriptions of their committee's activities. Meghan McSheffrey, the chair of the Environmental Concerns' Commit-
