Memorial Quilt to visit Triad

A portion of the NAMES project AIDS Memorial Quilt, an international memorial to those who have died of AIDS, will be on display in Greensboro, beginning Nov. 30 at the Greensboro Coliseum Exhibition Hall.

The 7pm opening ceremony will be led by community leaders. The display will continue on Dec. 1 (World AIDS Day) with a 10:30 am symbolic unfolding of a portion of the quilt. The display will be closed on Dec. 3 with a closing ceremony at 5:30pm, where local panels will be officially dedicated.

The NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt began in San Francisco, in June of 1987, as a personal response to the AIDS tragedy.

The Quilt is comprised of about 22,000 individual panels. Each three-by-six-foot cloth is made by a friend, lover, or family member in remembrance of an individual lost to AIDS.

Senator's Notebook

There are two corrections to last week's Senator's Notebook: Michael Pruden's absence from Senate is excused, and the amount of munchie money for the new meal plan is \$120, not \$103 as originally written.

The November 4 meeting began with Executive Officer reports. Jamie reported that the Judicial Review Task Force will be doing a review of the judicial system at Guilford and will make improvements and changes as they find necessary. They will be considering changes to the honor code system to encourage students to obey it and examining the judicial systems role in dealing with violence on campus.

SRC is working on developing guidelines for enforcement of the keg policy. SRC co-chair Reid Dossinger reported that a Dana house that had been having some problems with their theme has submitted a new theme and will be on probation until Christmas.

AAC is working on encouraging students to voluntarily turn in evaluations of their professors. AAC is also developing a campaign to raise the profile of the Career Development Center.

Reid Dossinger, reported that Environmental Concerns Committee and Forevergreen are in the midst of a trash bag campaign where people carry a clear plastic bag with them to place all the nonrecyclable trash they use in the bags. They hope to raise consciousness about the amount of garbage a person throws away in a week.

The Student Services Committee and the Community Relations Committee are working together on a Support Services appreciation day.

The November 4 Senate meeting was the first week of the Senate Faculty Invitation Program. Every week each of two Senators are asked to invite a faculty member to Senate. Chris Behm introduced Alex Stoesen, a pro-

fessor of history at Guilford. Dr. Stoesen thanked Senate for inviting him and gave a short, fascinating talk on the history of student government at Guilford. Stoesen said that the first student government at Guilford started in 1928 and consisted of separate governments for men and women.

Senators were given their official Senate nameplates. Senate members were asked to submit comments they have about Senate meetings to Jen. The Executive Council will use this feedback to make improvements in Senate meetings.
