Remmes, a first-year student. "It can be made much easier for the students and much quicker for the students."

Remmes, who currently serves on the Budget Committee, said the reform plans strive to eliminate "nickel and dime financing."

He added that the reform plan is idealized but contains "elements to it that you can start to work in."

In its campaign, the Ewell ticket stresses its familiarity with the processes and responsibilities of Senate.

"Senate is driven by the representatives and the committees are the vehicle for expression of the concerns of the general student body," said vice-presidential candidate Chris Behm, a junior who is currently serving as co-chair of the Student Residence Council.

"From my experience I know that it is imperative that the treasurer has a strong accounting and financial management background," said treasurer candidate Burton, who added that he offered "continuity" to a position that has seen "five treasurers within the last two years."

"We're hoping that we can lead

by example," said Ewell.

"We listen to the needs of people," said secretary candidate Terrence Laster, a sophomore. "Mainly what we're doing is just facilitating the needs of the students."

Tomlinson said his ticket was also dedicated to improving communication and increasing the effort to recruit new talent.

Secretary candidate Shingai Jaravaza said that he hopes to "put clubs in a position to work together."

"My job will be to foster those communications and help them along the process," said Jaravaza, a junior who is currently president of the International Relations Club.

"There's so much talent and potential at Guilford and if we are to assume leadership next year, we want to tap into that, because students deserve the full experience of what we can offer each other," said Kasun

"By doing this we'll make the campus groups stronger, provide more leadership, and stimulate community awareness," said Tomlinson, who added that these plans involve working closely with Project Community and *The Guilfordian*.

Ewell said that his ticket has projects planned for the new Senate year, including setting up a Senate table in Founders Hall for purposes of getting student feedback concerning important issues and producing a periodic Senate report. Additionally, Ewell said he hopes to improve the record-keeping process of Senate business, making it more "in-depth and consistent" and "accessible to students."

"These are the techniques, not the issues," said Behm. "We can't predict what they're [the issues] going to be next year."

"We hope to have progressive leadership and that means getting things done," said Burton.

"Students deserve a fair shake at getting involved and we want to provide as many opportunities and avenues . . . as possible," said Kasun.

"I'm confident Senate will be in good hands regardless of who wins," said senior Brian Sugioka, chair of the Elections Committee.

A candidates forum will be held this Sunday, at a time and place to be announced.

Elections will be held Tuesday, February 22, in the Founders lobby, from 7:00am to 7:30pm. Seniors are eligible voters and all students must present their id's in order to vote.
