Dan Poteet came to speak to Senate on November 29, 1995 to discuss the resignation of Chief Financial Officer Carlos Holder. Poteet informed Senate that Holder did in fact resign and was not fired. The resignation was said to "imply nothing" about the state of Guilford's finances. Dick Coe will be the interim CFO.

Dave Fleig reported that the Budget Committee was to meet with Residential Life to discuss the role of Hall Councils. The current system is apparently not working effectively, as there is dissatisfaction with use of money, events, and

lack of consensus among the Councils.

Student Services are continuing effort to publicize the recycling policy. They will also meet with the designer of the Underground on Thursday at 3:30.

The SRC reported to Senate that they are discussing more effective uses for Hall Council money. Ideas have to do with representation of dorms and the use of the consensus procedure in decision-making.

In regards to the issue of the "Possible Statement of Guilford's Identity," it was reported to Senate that the faculty had changed the

first paragraph of the Statement to "Guilford is an independent Quaker liberal arts College...." There was a general feeling of comfort with the change among Senators. The actual proposal will be brought in and discussed more thoroughly at the next meeting.

Norm Gibbs, Director of Information Technology, spoke to Senate about computing on campus. Gibbs remarked that he would like to improve communication among students and the Computer Services staff. Gibbs suggested the formation of a focus group as a way to get feedback from students.

M.L.K. celebration plans are rapidly taking shape

The college's Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration Series is rapidly taking shape with the help of a planning group consisting of students, faculty, staff and administrators.

The series will open on Thursday, January 11 at 7:30 p.m. in Sternberger with kickoff speaker Dr. William Turner, Assistant Professor of Black Church Studies and Research at Duke University. He will speak about the life of Martin Luther King in the context of church history.

On Monday, January 15, activities have been organized for the entire day, starting with morning

worship at 9:00 a.m. in Boren and ending with the traditional candlelight "Tribute to Martin Luther King, Jr." sponsored by AACS in Dana Auditorium.

Student-organized workshops and seminars will occur Monday afternoon and will be included in subsequent publicity. A panel discussion accompanying theatrical vignettes presented by Guilford's Diversity Dramatists is being developed for Monday afternoon. More details and publicity will follow; in the meantime, the planning group urges members of the community to reserve these times on their personal calendars.
