Dr. Davidson MacDowell Douglas, president of the Presbyterian College at Clinton, South Carolina, will become president of the University of South Carolina at Columbia, succeeding the late Dr. William D. McElwain, who died last May.

Eugene V. Debs, noted apostle of Socialism, died on Wednesday evening, October the twentieth, after a month's illness in a sanatorium near Chicago.

Queen Marie of Roumania, in an impromptu address to a large gathering of people in Baltimore, Maryland, urged the women of the world to strive for permanent world peace. Her Majesty, alluding to the horrors of the Great War, said: "Perhaps the war was the way which opened our hearts to each other. I speak from the woman's standpoint, and woman's ideal is peace. I believe that women are a great factor in the procurement of peace."

A new record for swimming the distance from Albany to New York has been achieved by Mrs. Charlotte Moore Schoenfeld, who swam the distance of 100 miles in 67 hours and 11 minutes. The former holder of the record, Mrs. Corson, who was the second woman to swim the English channel, covered the distance of 158 miles down the Hudson in 63 hours and 55 minutes.

The annual football game between North Carolina State College and Davidson eleven, in 1927, will be played in the Greensboro Coliseum War Memorial Stadium on November the fifth, 1927. It is the first major contest yet booked for the Stadium, which is one of the most complete athletic plants in this section.

Anthony Svehla, who had previously served as premier, is head of the new cabinet in Czechoslovakia.

A new cashmere ray tube, which has removed hair from an animal and has seemingly grown hair of a different color on the same spot, which has made cold stone luminous as if heated, and produced surprising results on gas, has been discovered by Dr. W. D. Coolidge, assistant director of the research laboratory of the General Electric Company in Philadelphia.

A botanical expedition, headed by Ellsworth B. Killip, has left the Smithsonian Institute for a tour of scientific exploration in South America.

The oldest real Daughter of the American Revolution died on October the nineteenth, at the age of 102, in her home in Hartford, Connecticut. She was Mrs. Sarah Bradley, so far as is known the oldest person in New England. Her father, Allen Rowse, enlisted in the year 1778 in a Connecticut unit of the continental army.

The German staff officer who first advised the Kaiser to abdicate his throne, is the new chief of the Feldwehr, or German national army. He replaces General Von Seeckt, who was forced out because he admitted a son of the former crown prince to the army.

A contest conducted by an English journal to determine the world's most beautiful public utilities buildings, resulted in the choice of three buildings, one in Switzerland, one in England and the third in America. The Alabama Power Company building in Birmingham, Alabama, is the American winner.

The subject, "A Journalistic Career and the Preparation for it," Dr. Willoughby spoke first of the field of journalism, of its demand upon an individual entering the profession, and of the severe test to which that individual is subjected. From the very beginning of his career, she brought out as the requisites of a successful journalist, accuracy, powers of observation and powers of expression. Preparation for the profession consists, first of all, of a thorough knowledge of the English languages, its derivation from other languages, and its use today. A second important point in the preparation for a journalistic career, is the gaining of knowledge of politics, both in America and in Europe. The study of American politics includes the History of America, the Constitution and Foreign Affairs. Following Dr. Willoughby's address, were scheduled several discussion groups, on the subjects of annuals, magazines and newspapers, concluding in a general business session and a report from the best annual.

The final session of the twelfth semi-annual meeting is adjourned on Saturday morning, October the thirteenth, at twelve o'clock.
