What the World is Doing.

The Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent says a report is current that Leon Trotsky, former Soviet War Commissar and now a leader of the Opposition Party in Moscow, has been assassinated. Messages from Moscow and Leningrad give the same report. There has been no confirmation, however, from any official sources.

Charles A. Lindbergh returned to Washington on November 14 to receive from President Coolidge the coveted Hubbard Medal, and to be acclaimed by a historical gathering of other ocean flyers who made their past year memorable for aviation. The Hubbard medal is an award of the National Geographic Society for outstanding accomplishment in exploration. The award places Lindbergh alongside such illustrious pioneers as Commander Robert S. Peary, Sir Ernest Shackleton, and Commander Richard E. Byrd, who were among the seven to receive the medal previously.

Moving to slash "red tape" from the tax law, the House Ways and Means Committee on November 15, adopted recommendations of the Joint Congressional Taxation Committee designed for that purpose. Ambiguous phrases in the law that call for Treasury interpretation and often lead to court battles were removed in the report of the seven-member committee. Changes in the "earned income" section were also considered by the Ways and Means committee. Where present law requires thirteen calculations, it was proposed to have only one.

Announcement by Dr. J. S. Betts, president of the North Carolina Board of Dental Examiners, that Duke University will establish within the next two years a dental department ranking as the best in the world, was the outstanding feature on the opening day of the seventh annual convention of the Second District Dental Society of North Carolina which opened its sessions at the Robert E. Lee Hotel on Monday morning, November 14.

Rescue workers, using dynamite in an effort to penetrate wreckage in the Pittsburgh disaster, caused by the gas tank explosion, located the bodies of six additional victims behind a boiler in the tottering plant of the Pittsburgh Clay Pot Company. This brought the known list of dead to twenty-seven.

A modern inland waterway system that would solve the transportation problem and give aid to farmers by reducing grain shipment costs was visualized by Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, in an address before the Mississippi Valley Association's ninth annual convention.

"I believe that the statement that by the modernization of the Mississippi and Great Lakes system of waterways we shall decrease freight on grain to world markets by ten cents a bushel is not far wrong," declared Secretary Hoover.
