Albany, N. Y. The New York Assembly passed by an 85-to-62 vote, a bill petitioning for the calling for a National Constitutional Convention to be limited in scope to consideration of repeal of the 18th Amendment.

Washington. Alexander Legge, Chairman of the Federal Farm Board has announced his resignation from the board in order to resume his duties as President of The International Harvester Company.

Canada. Viscount Willingdon, Governor-General of Canada is appointed Governor of India. He will succeed Lord Irwin, whose five-year term expires in April.

Belgium. Emil Vandervele, former Belgian foreign minister, denounces his country's alliance with France as useless. He fears lest Belgium be dragged into wars concerning the Polish or Italian Frontiers.

Spain. The Spanish Dictator, General Berenguer, in a newspaper interview promises that before March 1 there will be a Spanish National election, a new constitution and the end of dictatorship.

At the request of the Unemployment Committee, The Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. made a sample survey of unemployment among its industrial policy holders in forty-six of the larger cities. It indicates that between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 persons in the United States were unemployed in the first week of December 1930.
