Today we are motivated by the doctrine of Jesus and we should be more unified by His having been here on earth. We are forced to conclude, however, that the kingdom that Jesus spoke of has not come. We are filled with thoughts of hatred. The Greeks, the Romans, and the Anglo-Saxons all worshipped their own national Gods before Christ's coming, and there was no one God for all the world. Then Jesus came to the earth, and when he said "Our Father," he meant it for all the world, and all men became brothers.

But have we learned to live as brothers? We still don't have true World Fellowship. We must act as if the Kingdom of God has already come; when we do, we will not hate each other any longer.

Mr. Roberts has been in the mission fields in Africa during past years, and he told of the antagonism of the tribes before the coming of the Gospel. When men of different tribes met on the trail they fought—and one must be killed before either could continue on his way. But, since the Gospel has been carried to this heathen land, a wonderful change has taken place. Mr. Roberts said that he has seen 17

men of 17 different tribes standing before the communion table, side by side, with peace in their hearts and contentment, and then they took the emblems of the communion out to their people.

With our vaunted civilization, have we learned to live and love in His name? When we do, we can have safety and security, and the Kingdom of God can come on the earth.

J. FRED ESSARY LECTURES IN GREENSBORO

Views On Current Political Situation Given

J. Fred Essary, who is the chief correspondent of "The Baltimore Sun" in the Washington office, gave a lecture in Greensboro recently. This was the fourth lecture of the season given under the auspices of the Lecture Series of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina.

Mr. Essary, a tall, handsome man with a delightful sense of humor, held the attention of his listeners by reminiscing for them his experiences in and his impressions of Washington. He has seen the coming in of seven presidents and the going out of six. He spoke in a general way of our present situation. He was complimentary of President Roosevelt in most of his policies. He said

that if he were the President, he would call in his family and make it clear to them that he, Franklin D. Roosevelt, had been elected president, and that the children's hour had ended.

Mr. Essary believed the brain trusters should be men of capability and experience, so that when the president felt the need of being advised, he would be surrounded by trained people to advise him.

The speaker stated that from all evidences the Constitution would be the issue of the next campaign, but since the Constitution could not do anything, he thought the issue would be the pocketbook of the American people.

Several members of the Salem faculty, as well as some of the students, attended this lecture.

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) resort for his health at the time that he wrote this letter. His beloved was at a place beginning with the letter K (Beethoven did not mention the name of the place), which was two days journey from where Beethoven was.

Beethoven wrote this letter Thursday, July 6. We find that the years 1795, 1801, 1807, 1812, 1828, have the date July 6 on a Thursday; therefore Dean Vardell took up each year mentioned above and told where Beethoven was at the time; the women he knew; the ones he was supposed to be in love with; and the possibilities of each being Beethoven's really beloved or the one whom the "Moonlight Senato" was written. Scholars believe that the year 1812 is probably the year in which Beethoven wrote the letter, because of his age

and the fact that he said in his letter that he was at a place where he could lead a quiet life.

Although he had many loves in his life and many famous and interesting women as friends, no one has yet discovered direct proof as to which lady was his true beloved, and for which lady he really wrote the "Moonlight Senato."
