In the afternoons, discussion groups were held, where one came face to face with such statements as; "War is a biological phenomena. What will we do with uneducated adolescents? Why doesn't America join the League? The NYA?"

Miss Schwalbe concluded: "It may seem wrong to tell you at the end of this review that the theme of the Congress was 'Youth in a Changing World,' but perhaps if you try to think back over what I have said you can see that the benefits of such a congress do not lie in the good it does a college or the good it does on individual. This type of meeting in my opinion is merely a gesture showing American adults and adults of the world what our generation is thinking and how we as students and tomorrow's leaders regard the things they have done and are doing."

PENN UNIVERSITY DISCIPLINES FOUR FOR PUBLICATION OF POEM

Philadelphit, Pa. (NSFA) — The Literary Editor and two co-editors of The Red and Blue, University of Pennsylvania literary publication, were placed on probation until February and barred from all extra-curricular activities in the future as a result of the publication of a poem, "Wanted, One Twin," called sacrilegious by University administrators. The fate of the author of the poem has not yet been determined.

Since all copies of the magazine were immediately recalled by administration it was impossible for the student body to judge the merits of the poem. The administration is appointing editors to replace those barred so that the exact nature of the piece will probably not be uncovered through the staff of the publication. Students on the campus are offering as high as \$15 for a copy which may have found its way out of the office.

Undergraduate groups on the University campus are reported to be preparing a statement asking the administration for an open hearing on the merits of the poem in question.
