

Largest Bible That Was Ever Made



Louis Waynal, a Los Angeles carpenter, recently completed what is said to be the largest Bible in the world. Using a hand stamping machine which he constructed himself, he stamped into the three-foot pages of the book every separate letter, symbol and punctuation mark in the Bible, using as a pattern his own family book. The pages of the book, of which there are 8,048, are bound with metal and weigh 1,094 pounds. A comparative size of the Bible is obtainable in this photograph of Waynal, showing it to some children.
