TOURNAMENT TO BE HELD

In view of the approaching tournaments, we present for your inspection the following rules concerning proper golf etiquette:

- Be silent and motionless while another played makes a shot.
 The best place to stand is diagraphly away from a player in
- gonally away from a player in front of him and to his right.

 Never give him cause to worry about hitting you by standing back of him or some place where he is not sure of your position.
- 3. On the putting green, no one should stand beyond the hole in the line of a player's stroke.
- 4. Watch your shadow. Keep it off the line of play.
- 5. Allow the lpayer with the honor (player who has the lowest score on previous hole) to play before any other player tees his ball.
 6. No player should paly from the
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tee until the members of the party ahead have all played their second shots and are out of range nor play up to aputting green until the players ahead have holed out and moved away.

- 7. If you have lost a ball, motion to the players behind you to play through and then do not resume your play until they are out of range.
- 8. If for any reason you are playing slowly, motion the party be hind you through. It is the courtesy o fthe course and you will play better if you do not feel as if you were being hurried by someone behind you.

In addition to the students and faculty, guests on the campus for May Day are invited to come and towns people are urged to come then or at any time during the month.

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
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
