and Ralph Emerson, she met Charles Dana, later editor of the New Yory Sun, and married him. Miss Draper received encouragement for her work from her grandmother and from Paderewski who visited her home in 1913.

Aedian Hall in London was the scene of the first public appearance. After this initial performance, she toured through England and Scotland doing "recitals", and appearing on various hall programs. She appeared on one bill which particularly impressed itself upon her memory, because the cue for her number came after the tame sealion act when the seal came paddling by her dressing room door. Then she came to New York where for six months she gave dramatic monologues before enthusiastic theatre goers. Miss Draper comes to Winston-Salem after a successful two year tour of Europe and South America and Broadway.

Miss Draper has been called "monologist", "regiter", diseuse", "impersonator", and "eloshe prefers to be designated as an "actor". Alone on the stage she conjures up characters from every walk of life with the truth and authenticity that is the artist's genius. She has captivated audiences all the way around the world from New York and Kansas City to Singalpore and the Fiji islands; the fact that the audiences have returned to see her again and again is a tribute to her genius.

The presentation of dramatic monologues is not new to Winston-Salem audiences; they received a similiar program by Miss Cornelia Otis Skinner in 1937 with avid praise. Miss Draper is even more widely known nationally than Miss Skinner.

Her programs contain from eight to ten monologues and acquaint the audience with more than fifty characters. She has twenty-four sketches in her repertoire with more than one hundred and fifty characters portrayed. The sketches, in English with occasional snatches of French, German, or Italian, are authentic and are drawn from actual experiences. Her characters live for the listener through the careful and unusual choice of detail by which Miss Draper depicts

It has been said of her by critics that she is "the foremost mimic of our time". She "brings a variety of characters to tingling life." Concerning "In a church in Italy" which she will give in Winston-Salem on Monday night, one New


