



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

The Opera group is conducted by Sylvan Levin, who has led the Philadelphians across the country on their tour of over 75 cities. It was he who conceived the idea of a young, spirited company of American artists which would bring grand opera back to life in this country. He pondered the idea through the 10 years he served as assistant to Leopold Stokowski. Then he met David Hocker, a bank clerk, and the result of this combination was the Philadelphia Opera Company.

In December, 1939, the company made its debut, and a year later had created quite a stir in music circles. All the operas presented by the Philadelphia Opera Company are in English. This is so that the American people may enjoy opera as it was intended to be enjoyed.

There are no stars in the company. A girl who may be singing the title role in CARMEN may have a subordinate role in DIE FLED-ERMAUS and understudy the leading role in a third work. Staging and costumes keep the spirit of the time in which the opera story takes place, but they have been streamlined to suit modern tastes.

The Philadelphia Opera Company is developing native art and talent. This American Opera company is a group holding its own as an American institution and in company with cultural offerings of Cosmopolitan character, such as the Civic Music Association.

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
