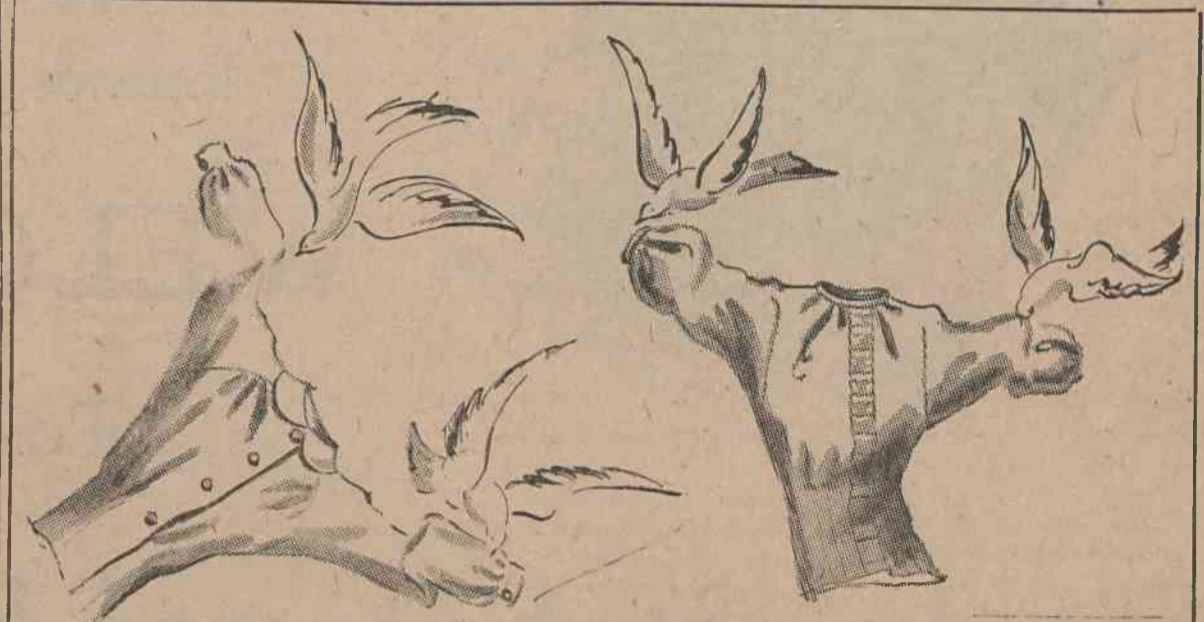
Excelling in history and social studies, part of the general cul-
