Special awards will be given to girls making varsity for the first time in sports this year. In the selection of the varsity teams, attendance at practice and sportsmanship will be considered as well as outstanding ability.

A varsity team is selected by a committee composed of: the manager of the sports, class managers, president of the Athletic Association, and the Director of Physical Education. A loving cup will be given to the spring tennis and riding champions. No girl may receive a special award more than once.

Awarding of points shall be as follows: To members of varsity teams, two points; to members of sub-varsity teams, one point; to members of class teams, four points; to a substitute on a class team, one or two points, depending on the service rendered.
