

### Press Group Will Meet

The North Carolina Collegiate Press Association will hold its second postwar meet at Duke University March 18, 19 and 20, according to an announcement today by Clay Felker, Webster Groves, Mo., president of the association and associate editor of the Duke Chronicle.

About 200 editors and business managers of collegiate publications are expected for the convention. They will represent 35 universities, colleges and junior colleges in North Carolina.

The program for the convention will feature a number of leaders in the field of journalism: Harry Martin, president of the American Newspaper Guild; Roscoe Ellard, associate dean of Columbia University School of Journalism; Jack Lait, editor of the New York Daily Mirror; Sidney Standard, news editor of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch; J. G. Taylor Spink, publisher of The Sporting News; and representatives from Mademoiselle, Junior Bazaar and the fashion editor of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

Officers of the NCCPA in addition to Felker are Jim Gribben, Davidson College, vice-president; Peggy Davis, Salem, secretary; Ken Coble, State College, treasurer; and Dr. E. E. Folke, Wake Forest College, permanent secretary.

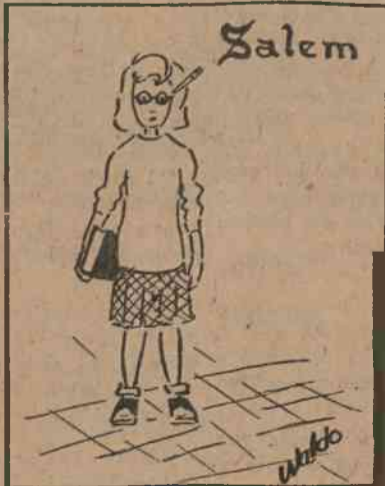

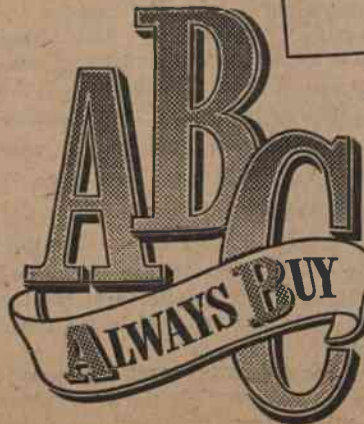
