Although General Chennault has released a statement advising the U.S. to rush aid to the Nationalists, under a threat of a Communist dominated Asia, Secretary of State Acheson has replied that the U.S. does not plan to change her policy toward China. In his reply Acheson pointed out that the aid which we have already given the Nationalists has done little good. As a matter of fact, he said, much American material has been captured by the Communists, who are using it to sweep through China.
