ernment appealed to the Security Council, which will deal with the situation immediately.

The outlook is bad, stated Dr. Singer, since Russia will veto any measures condemning Iran's action. The use of force by the Council would mean an all-out war.

"This situation is another indication of the weakness of the U. N.," said Dr. Singer. If a solution is to be found, it will be outside the U. N. between the United States and Britain, he added.

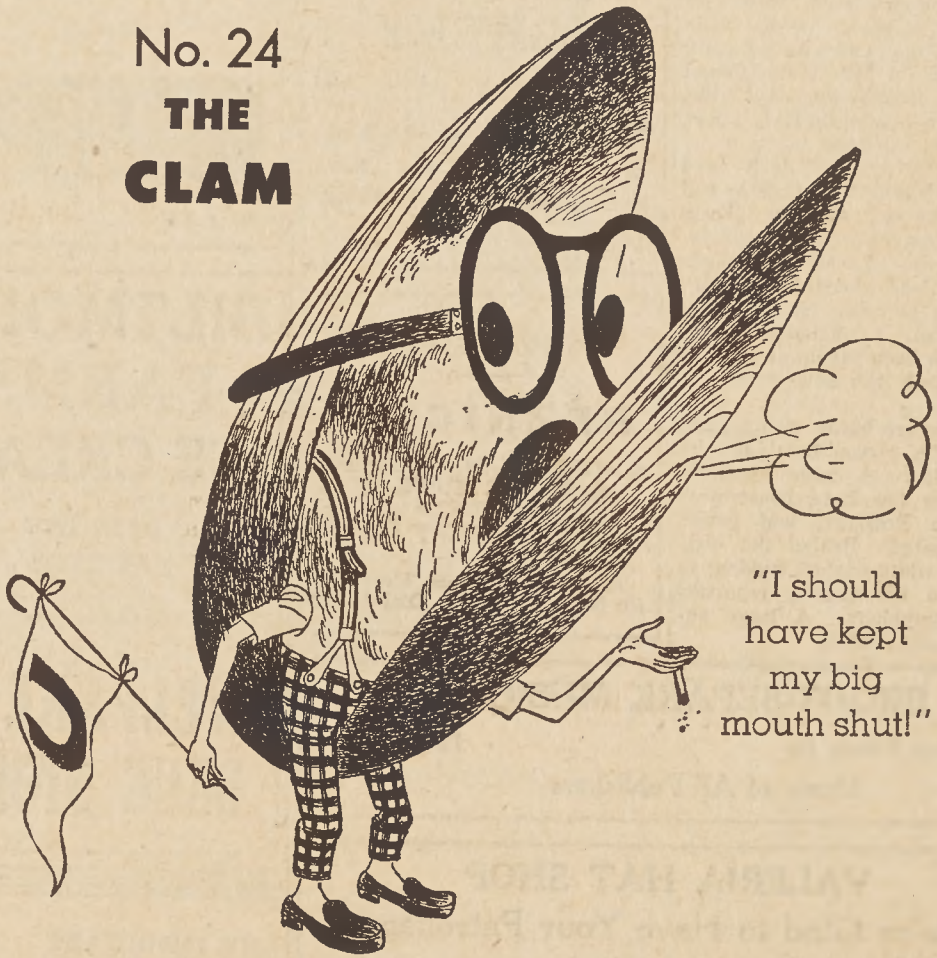
