

Newman To Be Guest Pianist November 10

Dr. William S. Newman, associate professor of music and chairman of instruction in piano at the University of North Carolina, will present a piano recital at 8:30 p.m., Wednesday, November 10, in Memorial Hall.

In addition to his positions at UNC, Dr. Newman is chairman of the Senior Piano Committee of Music Teachers National Association. He is also a member of the Executive Board of American Musicological Society.

Native to Cleveland, Ohio, Dr. Newman received most of his formal education there and his BS in Music Education, MA in Music History, and Ph D in musicology at Western Reserve University. He received private training in theory and composition, music education, piano, and musicology.

Among other awards he won scholarships in music from the Cleveland Board of Education and the Concord School of Music and fellowships from Western Reserve University. At UNC in 1947, he received a Carnegie Research Grant to implement his "History of the Sonata Idea."

Dr. Newman has presented concerts and lecture-recitals in museums, art galleries, universities, and other educational institutions. In various cities he has given first performances of sonatas by Rust, d'Indy, Sessions, Bloch, Hewitt, Wagner, and others.

Before assuming his position at UNC, Dr. Newman was employed as choral director and instructor of appreciation, orchestra, band, theory, and music history in various high schools, universities, and music schools. He was also a private teacher in piano and theory.

For two years Dr. Newman was with the Army Air Force Intelligence.

Dr. Newman is author of "Thirteen Keyboard Sonatas of the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries", "The Pianist's Problems", and "Keyboard Sonatas by the Sons of Bach". He has in preparation "A History of the Sonata Idea" and "Toward An Understanding of Music". He has had published critical editions, reviews of books and music, and articles for numerous periodicals. He possesses one of the world's most comprehensive sonata libraries.

An extensive traveler, Dr. Newman has studied in twelve countries of Western Europe. He has a speaking knowledge of French and a reading knowledge of French, German, Italian, Dutch, Latin, Spanish, and Portuguese.
