Charles Medlin, cellist and member of the Salem College music faculty will make his debut as soloist of the Winston-Salem Symphony at the orchestra's concert Thursday, February 17. Violinist Jacobowsky, also a member of the music faculty, Celia Smith, Suzanne Gordon, and Patsy Hopkins, sophomores, will appear with the orchestra.

Mr. Medlin will be the featured soloist in the Concerto for Violoncello in A minor by Camille Saint-Saens. The program also includes Polonaise from the opera Christmas Night by Rimsky-Korsakov, La Folia by Corelli-Soppin, and the Fourth Symphony Op. 48 by Alexandre Glagoumow.

A native of High Point, Mr. Medlin received his first musical training there. After studying with William Klentz at the University

of North Carolina, he graduated from Julliard School of Music.

Mr. Medlin has performed with quartets and ensembles in New York, Indiana, and North Carolina. He is cellist with the Salem College Trio.
