Interested in seeing how Salem students stood with college graduates in the literary field, Miss Byrd recently took a poll among her freshman, sophomore, and junior students.

A total of 57 students were asked to name the authors of twelve well-known books. Thirty-seven percent named at least three, fifty-one percent named from four to six, and twelve per cent could give the authors of seven to ten of these books.

This same poll was taken among a cross section of college graduates and showed that nine percent

of them could not give the author of a single one and thirty-nine per cent could not name more than three. The remaining fifty-two percent could give only four.

The books were: **An American Tragedy, Babbitt, Canterbury Tales, Gulliver's Travels, Leaves of Grass, The Old Wives Tales, Utopia, Vanity Fair, The Origin of the Species, The Wealth of Nations, The Rubaiyat, and Tom Jones.**

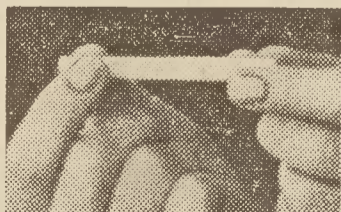

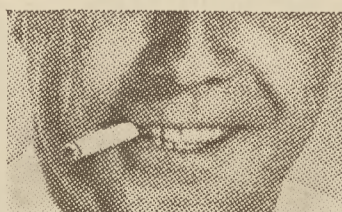
