joyfully reported, "We are just as happy as when the freshmen voted almost unanimously to approve the plan" Nina Ann said, "We think the Rat Week we propose will do a better job of helping freshmen get to know each other, upperclassmen and faculty, than past Rat Week.

## Erwin Robbins Receives Music Appointment

Dr. Donald M. McCorkle, director of The Moravian Music Foundation, Inc., (has announced) the appointment of Erwin Robbins as administrative assistant to the director of the foundation, beginning July 1. Confirmation of Miss Robbins' appointment was made during a recent semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees.

The rising sophomores plan to distribute beanies among the freshmen as soon as they arrive. Freshmen will also know their sweet sophomores, who will act as big sisters, when they arrive. In September plans will begin to be made for a show of which freshmen will present the largest part. However, upperclassmen will be asked to present skits.

Erwin is a senior piano major and English minor. At Salem she has been active also in journalism, having served this year as Feature Editor of the *Salemite*. She has already completed one year of service with the foundation as a student assistant, in which capacity she has assisted in the preparation of music for the forthcoming Early American Moravian Music Festival which will be held in Winston-Salem during the week of June 22-28.

Rat Week itself will be held in October. It will begin on a Monday at lunch. On Monday afternoon there will be organized rapping—that is, the freshman class will be divided into groups of six or more and given jobs to do around campus. The rapping is to be planned ahead of time. Mr. Yarborough and faculty will be consulted about jobs they want done. There will be absolutely no hazing.

In joining the staff on a full-time basis, she will be active in furthering the manifold responsibilities of the foundation in research, publications, and education. The Moravian Music Foundation is the first non-profit educational institution to be devoted to the re-discovery and advancement of American music written before 1850. It was established as a corporation in the State of North Carolina in 1956 to function as a non-sectarian agency of the Moravian Church in America. It is the only foundation to be elected to constituent membership in the National Music Council.

On Tuesday night final preparation will be made for the show and the Field Day, to be held on Wednesday.

On Wednesday afternoon a Field Day will be held on the athletic field with both students and faculty participating. Following the games there will be a picnic at which the freshmen will serve. The show will be held that night and afterwards there will be a party for the freshmen and sophomores.

The student body will be asked to vote on this plan at the next Student Government meeting.
